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Culture, Society, and Politics: Exploring Northeast India through the Lenses of Social Sciences and Humanities

The eight northeastern states in India stand as a region marked by heterogeneity and complexities. Their remarkable diversity includes over hundreds of ethnic and sub-ethnic groups speaking numerous languages and dialects, creating a unique fabric of the region's culture and society. The region's geographical terrain shows similar diversity with the mighty Himalayas in the north, the fertile lands with rich natural resource deposits at its centre, and the lush southern rainforests. This unique positioning has profoundly influenced the region's historical trajectories, socio-cultural identities, and political dynamics.

The region's distinctive terrain, often clubbed together under the umbrella term "Northeast" or North East Region (NER) by the State and the broader Indian society, belies the intricate diversity that characterises it. Popularised during the colonial period in the nineteenth century, this neologism, while expedient for administrative purposes, obscures the rich diversity and associated complexities under a veneer of uniformity. The intricate interplay of languages, ethnicity, culture, and religion has created a rich tapestry of social, cultural, political, and spiritual realities of the present. While this diversity contributes to the region's vibrancy, its parochial tendencies also fuel conflicts and tensions as manifested in the ongoing ethnic clash in Manipur.

Despite its modest population size within India, Northeast occupies a strategically paramount position at the intersection of South, East, and Southeast Asia. It shares its borders with five nations: Bangladesh, Bhutan, China, Myanmar, and Nepal making it the epicenter of debates and discussions when considering it as a gateway to Southeast Asia. However, often perceived as territorially and administratively remote from the 'mainland', it exists as a separate 'other' in the broader Indian psyche. Such geographical and psychological distance has bred tumultuous borderland politics, secessionist movements and insurgencies. It has also exacerbated issues of marginalization, multi-dimensional underdevelopment, and high unemployment. Furthermore, the challenges are compounded by problems such as inadequate resource allocation, insufficient infrastructure development, and limited educational access, among others. These conditions not only fuel youth discontent but also create a fertile ground for conflict and radicalization. In addition, there is the perennial discourse of tribal versus non-tribal, insider versus outsider, and native versus immigrant which present further challenges to peaceful cohabitation and administration. That being said, the region continues to be a focal point of successive Indian Government's initiatives, including the Look East Policy, now renamed as the Act East Policy. It remains to be seen to what extent these initiatives improve conditions on the ground and whether the region will have an influence on the broader South Asian landscape during India's G20 presidency and beyond.

On the academic front, the lack of scholarly research on the region has significant implications. Crucial issues such as socio-cultural complexities, regional conflicts, economic development, governance challenges, and indigenous knowledge systems remain overlooked and undocumented. This knowledge gap not only hinders effective decision-making but also perpetuates misconceptions about the region, obstructing development efforts and a nuanced understanding of important issues. Addressing this research gap is essential for Northeastern India's advancement, necessitating initiatives to promote research in the social sciences and humanities fostering interdisciplinary collaboration to uncover the region's complexities with due scholarly interventions.

The proposed conference aims to address the dearth of scholarly research on Northeast India by assembling scholars, social scientists, and practitioners from India and abroad, focusing on the eight northeastern states. The conference also aims to provide an academic platform to facilitate an intellectual exchange and conversation between researchers from different backgrounds such as sociology, economics, history, political science, geography, literature, anthropology, linguistics, philosophy, psychology, among others. By presenting their work, participants will contribute to a deeper understanding of Northeast India's complexities, nurturing a scholarly network, facilitating comparative discussions, conceptual and theoretical debates and deliberations upon interdisciplinary exchange. Athena 2023 seeks to explore some of these ever-pertinent issues and concerns which are based on, but not limited to the following themes:
